Theme: "Victims' Voices Lead the Way"

There are many ways that you can help fight the horrific global problem of human trafficking, a crime that exploits women, children and men for numerous purposes including forced labour and sex. The International Labour Organization estimates that 21 million people are victims of forced labour globally. An estimated 40.3 million people—primarily women and girls—are currently being trafficked and exploited for profit. As Pope Francis urges, our aim should be "for every enslaved person to return to being a free agent of his or her own life and to take an active part in the construction of the common good." WHAT CAN WE DO?

<u>Stay informed</u> and support organizations like <u>Talitha Kum</u>, a worldwide network of consecrated religious committed against trafficking who have presented three "causes and vulnerabilities that contribute to human trafficking": 1) unequal power structure in society, especially related to women, children, and indigenous; 2) inadequate migration policies that leave people vulnerable in an increasingly interconnected world; 3) an economic model that exploits human and environmental resources for the profit of the few in contrast with the exploitation of the many.
